Club Statistics



Last month was the team shoot and I am happy to report our numbers were up. We had 14 braces up from 8 last year. The jackpot was \$130.00 this year up from \$50 last year. Somehow Jim managed to get two of the three draws. We had some kid's games and nice prizes for them. We went through all the burgers and dogs and had some great desserts and side dishes. We were in a different field this year and the gallery had a better view, we even had cover to duck under during the rain shower towards the end of the day. It has been suggested that we work on a new format next year for the jackpot to allow more folks to get a shot at it.

2014 Training Event Rate Changes

Due to increased pricing of birds, insurance, fuel, etc., the board voted to raise the event day training prices as follows:

Pointers (Advanced/Braces)		First Dog each additional dog
Pointers (Intermediate) Retrievers (Intermediate and Advanced)	\$25.00 \$25.00	per dog per dog
Puppies (All breeds)	\$20.00	per dog

Our cost of birds increased this year from \$5.50 to \$6.75 This is before fuel costs to pick them up.

Hey there, my name is Betty Pellham.

My first knowledge of the GVHRC dog club began at the Eugene Sportsmen's Show. I had stopped by the booth and met Chris and Crystal Laing. I explained I had just purchased two German shorthair puppies and had shortly discovered I had no control over them, which needed to change and quickly. Chris and Crystal strongly encouraged me to join.

I will have just completed my third year of membership this coming super bowl. It has been a great experience for me, and it seems like just yesterday that the boys (Ben and Duke) and I were in puppy class.

It's been about 25 years or so since I first picked up a firearm and really started hunting. I started out big game hunting, then wanted to change it up and add to the difficulty and started turkey hunting with a shotgun. Of course, if you shoot a shotgun, you have to shoot trap, skeet, continental trap, some five stand and sporting clays. From there I went to black powder for a long time and to international competition.

The next thing had to be bow hunting. I wouldn't say I'm an experienced hunter, but I've done okay for a lady out in the woods today. I know I still have much more to learn and grow in the sport of bird hunting and especially dog training.

I chose German shorthair pointers for the breed I wanted to have for bird dogs. After I attended one of the first ODFW Becoming an Outdoor Woman (BOW) programs, I hunted for pheasants with a Springer spaniel in the morning, then a German shorthair later in the day. Unfortunately the Springer didn't find me any birds, but I soon discovered with pointers I could be prepared for the birds to fly – that was my game!

The GVHRC club members have helped me with countless training skills with (Ben and Duke) my boys. I participated in two of Stan Zorn's wonderful classes, and made good friends with Alice Burke, Linda Ackers and Steve Arms and my journey with my boys has been most enjoyable for us. We owe our survival through puppy class to our new dog club friends. I have gained so much by being a GVHRC member. I have made great friendships and gained great training partners with some really fine folks. The boys and I are honored that we can give back by volunteering our time with the ODFW programs. Training at club events gives my dog a new perspective. It gets her out of her normal training environment and away from what she knows. It is a great opportunity to really test her abilities and shows me what we still need to work on.

I have had a wonderful time with GVHRC. I have met some really great people who truly love their dogs. I have learned a few new training ideas that have really worked with my dog.

Amanda took a shot at judging with Ivan while Stan was out ill; although she gave it her all I don't think she liked the job! Amanda does AKC Hunt tests with her dog Emma and pitches in on the retriever side often to help with anything needed.

Training Tidbits by Stan Zorn



What a great time we all had at the Team Shoot. I hadn't been able to attend one for the last 3 years, but I don't want to miss another one. I've come up with some great amendments to the team shoot rules, but I may be the only one that appreciates

them. For example: Those who are age 30 and under have to use bb guns. OK, I realize it may be a little more difficult but with a lot practice and head shots, it could be done. Another idea was to hobble all those who are 5'9" or taller. Those long legged individuals have a definite advantage getting to the birds faster. I have a lot more ideas, but I need to get the board members drunk in order to get them passed.

The training tidbits this month will focus on **Retrieving**.

While I'm a firm believer in force fetching a dog to retrieve, it's not always necessary. If you plan on running hunt tests, National Shoot to Retrieve, or field trials, then by all means you should take the time to make sure your dog will retrieve on command whether he wants to or not. As a hunt test judge, I always feel bad when a dog has performed beautifully, but fails to retrieve to hand. He may have been tired after a long retrieve on a hot day and just drops it at your feet. For a hunter, that would be ok as long as the bird was dead. For a hunt test, it can mean a failure for a Senior or Master dog.

The advantages of doing a Force Fetch with your dog are the following:

- 1. If done correctly, it prevents hard mouthing
- 2. Even if the dog drops it at your feet, a fetch command will get a quick response
- 3. Your dog will be more responsive to other commands
- 4. If he fails to pick up a dummy or bird, you have a method for correction.

5. Done correctly your dog will be just as excited about retrieving as a natural retriever.

The drawbacks of force fetching a dog to retrieve are listed below:

1. If not done correctly, your dog will be worse that when he started the program.

- 2. If started and not finished, he will be worse.
- 3. It's the most difficult command to teach.
- 4. Timing has to be near perfect.

5. If you don't do it yourself, the cost to have it done can be more than \$1500.00

6. It's difficult to learn by reading a book or watching a DVD.

Many dogs are natural retrievers and don't require doing a force program. If taught to hold, they can be very reliable retrievers. If you're just hunting with your dog, it isn't necessary to go through the Force Fetch program, but it does make for a more reliable dog.

Pointer Page



The Place Board

The basics of yard work for most of us are heeling, whoa and come. Three of the most important building blocks for a pointing dog. All taught around the house no big expenses -front yard or back yard or walk to the mailbox.

In addition some of us use the Place board, again a tool that's very important and something I always train with. My Goal with my dogs is Steady to Wing, Shot and Fall. I think the place board is one of those very important building blocks to helping build a better dog to get there.

When your dogs are introduced to the place board I like to start that day with heel and whoa while on the leash and then add the Place Command and walk the dog up to the board, after all his feet are on the board I give my dog a high value treat. Always try to keep it fun and always reward with a treat. After just a few lessons your dog will start responding to the command place. I will add a second place board, move the dog back and forth between the boards and then add the whistle to the lesson. This will help in teaching you dog to quarter and also directing him to game when he's out in the field.

My objective with this article is to focus on Steady by incorporating the Place board.

Your dog must be thoroughly trained on the place command and respond up to a reasonable distance when told to place. You can add distractions to the dog while he's on the board, throw something or have another dog tease him, but make sure he knows he can't get of the board. Next get a pigeon from your coup and with the dog on place release the pigeon by throwing it on the ground so the pigeon lands and has to take off again... It is impossible for my dogs to stay on the board when we start this lesson so be ready to correct your dog get him back on the place board and start again, repetition...repetition...repetition it takes a while. You can use a buddy stick or a check cord or better a helper to help control you dog until your dog starts to figure out that he's there to watch the pigeon fly away and not run after .

Sounds easy (NOT) but that's the beginningPlace board and Pigeons lots of reps.

Whelping box-wood. The size is 72 1/2 long and 36 1/2 wide with a rail, it is made of wood with insulation on sides and bottom. I have used it for many years and there have not been any sick dogs or puppies in it. It has been disinfected after each litter.

Also available is a custom made moveable whelping room designed to fit in a corner of a garage which was made to order with 2 walls with sliders on the bottom (it can slide against the wall when not in use), outside size 72 1/2 by 36 1/2 , made of 2 X 4 s insulated and covered by a vinyl washable outside. This attaches with bolts to the walls. To move you just pull the pins and fold against the wall. There is a window in the short side and a door with a doggy door in the long side.
